

SUBJECT: Advancement Committee Meeting Report for January 24, 2024

In accordance with MGLA Chapter 30A and amended by On March 29, 2023, Governor Healey signed Chapter 2 of the Acts of 2023, which amongst other things, extends the remote meeting provision to March 31, 2025. other things, further extends temporary provisions pertaining to the Open Meeting Law to March 31, 2025. Specifically, this extension allows public bodies to continue holding meetings remotely without a quorum of the public body physically present at a meeting location, and to provide "adequate, alternative" access to remote meetings.

In accordance with the Open Meeting Law all votes taken during this meeting, in which a member participated remotely, were by roll call vote.

Present for the committee were Trustees Steve Immerman, Jim Lampassi Jr. (chair), Yalile Maldonado (vice chair), Samanda Morales, President Keenan (ex-officio), Vice President Cheryl Webster Crounse, Assistant Vice President Taylor Dunn, and Executive Assistant Hai Huynh.

Chair Lampassi Jr. called the meeting to order at 3:01 p.m.

Revisions to Committee Charter (action)

Vice President Webster Crounse noted that the proposed changes in the Committee Charter are representative of the name change of the unified organization, Alumni Association and Foundation, Inc.

A motion was made by Morales, seconded by Maldonado, and unanimously voted to recommend that the Board of Trustees approve the following motion pertaining to the committee charter.

Recommended motion: The Board of Trustees of Salem State University hereby approves the proposed changes to the Advancement Committee Charter as presented.

Meet the Moment Campaign Update (presentation attached)

Vice President Webster Crounse submitted a written report on Advancement including a report on fundraising as of November 30, 2023 for the committee's review prior to the meeting. As noted in the campaign update presentation, she shared that \$41,949,093 has been raised as of January 23, 2024 with \$13.7M for unrestricted, \$16.5M for financial assistance, \$9.5M for student success, and \$2.3M for SSU BOLD. Campaign totals included 5,791 donors with \$100 being the most common gift size. Seven gifts over \$1,000,000 were received and two gifts over \$5,000,000 were received. She noted that 53% of funds were received from corporations, foundations, and other organizations and 38% from alumni. New gifts to the campaign include a \$500,000 gift from the Klarman Family Foundation to the School of Social Work, \$100,000 from Rob and Rachel Lutts to create an internship scholarship and provide additional support for the Student Investment Fund, \$100,000 to

the center for International Education from Francis Hunkins and Patricia Hammil, and \$70,000 from Mario Gabelli for the Cabot Wealth Management Lab.

Vice President Webster Crounse also provided an update on the Massachusetts Public Higher Education Endowment Incentive Program approved by the state legislature for another year. The program encourages private fundraising and endowment growth by Commonwealth public higher education institutions and foundations. \$555,000 is earmarked for Salem State and is awaiting the Board of Higher Educatin's vote on the rules for securing the match. Once approved, a vote will be brought forward to the Board of Trustees in the February full Board meeting to authorize President Keenan and Vice President Webster Crounse to leverage the match program.

The calendar year end appeal was mailed to 58,000 alumni segmented by major receiving letters authored by each of the deans. Advancement is working with the deans to engage over 700 potential major gift donors who are deferred prospects to cultivate relationships before soliciting. Vice President Webster Crounse shared that the Your Impact in Action reports were mailed to 14,000 past donors including the Trustees and reviewed the content of the piece. Additionally, she went over the spring events including Charlotte Forten Hall Dedication, Naples Florida, the inaugural Internship Scholarship Fundraiser, Viking Warrior Day, and Alumni Weekend.

Questions

Trustee Morales asked how much are being donated to corporations out of that larger bucket of C&F. Vice President Webster Crounse shared that although not currently differentiated, the Advancement team would be happy to provide that data. Later in the meeting, Advancement's Assistant Vice President Dunn shared data she pulled during the meeting which noted that out of the 302 corporations and foundations, 54% are corporations and the others are a mix of family foundations, private foundations and non-profit organizations.

Trustee Immerman noted after reading VP Crounse's report that their was an uneven success of the priorities and asked if there was an area of concern of meeting the campaign's goal. Vice President Webster Crounse is optimistic and is not concerned. She shared that the Campaign Steering Committee is currently working on building out a stronger case for support for SSU BOLD in collaboration with Provost Silva. She noted that the work over the next four months will help provide momentum for raising money for that capital project in the year ahead.

Trustee Lampassi Jr. asked about deferred prospects and how that's defined. Vice President Webster Crounse shared that an individual has had multiple outreaches for connection about the university with no response or declined to meet they are then moved out of a gift officer's portfolio and marked deferred. Solicitors will utilize other methods of engaging these individuals before attempting to solicit.

There being no new business to come before the committee,

A motion was made by Immerman, seconded by Morales, and unanimously voted to adjourn the meeting. Lampassi Jr. asked for a roll call vote:

Board of Trustees Advancement Committee Charter

Purpose:

The Advancement Committee of the Board of Trustees shall be a permanent committee which will be active and involved in the identification of university priorities and long-term plans that should be supported by private philanthropy. This committee will concern itself with the public's perception of the university efforts to promote the university to various constituents. This committee will provide reports to the Salem State University Board of Trustees as necessary. The Advancement Committee shall have the following duties and powers:

- Recommendations to the full Board concerning how the university and the SSU <u>Alumni Association and</u> Foundation can work together as agreed to in the Memorandum of Agreement to support the university's priorities and long-term plans
- Recommendations with regard to policies and programs related to the advancement of the institution, including activities involving alumni, campaigns, the SSU community and other external bodies, in order to foster understanding of, and support for, the university and its mission.
- Recommendations with regard to plans, proposals and the acceptance of major gifts to the <u>Alumni Association and</u> Foundation on behalf of the university in accordance with the guidelines of the Naming Opportunities and Gift Recognition Policy and the Gift Acceptance Policy. This is inclusive of all private funds, including: special gifts, endowments, bequests, and other means as annual or campaign gifts.

Responsibilities for Advancement

- 1. Within the scope of existing policies and procedures, make recommendations to the Board for the naming of any physical facility, campus grounds or academic program as appropriate.
- In conjunction with the Salem State University <u>Alumni Association and</u>
 Foundation, set goals and funding priorities for major fundraising campaigns
 to benefit the university
- 3. In addition to making a personal gift, assist with the identification, education, cultivation and stewardship of prospects and donors to the university
- Assist with expanding the pool of volunteers for consideration as Trustees, <u>Alumni Association and</u> Foundation Board, <u>Alumni Board</u>, <u>Overseers</u>, Assistance Corporation, Campaign Committees and Deans Advisory Councils

Membership:

The Advancement committee shall have not fewer than three Trustees appointed by the Chair of the Board. The President shall be a member of the committee, ex officio, voting. Committee members may include individuals who are not trustees so long as the majority membership of the committee is comprised of trustees. The Chair shall have the authority to appoint non-trustee members advisory, nonvoting to the committee to serve until the next annual meeting. Members may be appointed to the committee on a temporary basis, by the Chair, as may be required.

Staff Designee:

The vice president for Advancement is the senior staff member supporting the committee for Advancement and SSU Alumni Association and Foundation matters.

Meetings:

The committee is expected to meet at least four times each academic year. Frequency and timing of meetings shall be determined by the chair of the Board of Trustees. Meetings shall be conducted in compliance with the state's Open Meeting Law. Executive sessions may be conducted periodically and shall be limited to those matters permitted by the state's Open Meeting Law.

Agenda, Minutes, and Reports

The chair of the committee, in collaboration with the staff designees, shall be responsible for establishing the agendas for meetings. An agenda, together with relevant materials shall be made available to committee members at least five days in advance of the meeting. Minutes for all meetings shall be drafted by the staff designee, reviewed by the committee chair, and approved by committee members at the following meeting.

The primary focus of our January 24, 2024, advancement committee meeting is to update the board of trustees on the *Meet the Moment* $^{\text{TM}}$ campaign, to update the Charter and discuss the State Endowment Match renewal.

Advancement Report:

The Meet the Moment[™] (MTM) campaign has raised \$40,932,403 — 55 percent of our \$75 million goal as of November 30, 2023. The State Endowment Incentive match program was renewed by the Board of Higher Education and Salem State to provide \$555,555 in endowment match funds. Advancement is awaiting the approval of the DHE to begin promoting this giving opportunity and expect to fully leverage the funds by fiscal year-end.

The advancement team continues to partner with donors and campus stakeholders to successfully secure new major gifts (\$50K+). Gifts of note since our last report to the board of trustees:

- Rob and Rachel Lutts made a \$100,000+ gift of securities to create a new endowed Internship Scholarship and additional support for the Lutts Student Investment Fund.
- George Dhionis made a \$50,000 cash gift to recreate a first-ever endowment in support of a Housing Scholarship for a Salem State student. This contribution follows George's attendance at the November 14, 2023, campaign engagement event hosted by steering committee members Dino Di Palma and Alumni Association and Foundation Chair Annalisa Di Palma, which resulted in a deeper connection to the mission of Salem State and priorities of the campaign.
- Salem State theater student, Alyssa Fluet, tragically passed away in the summer of 2023. To honor her legacy, her family and the family of her boyfriend (Burke) created a scholarship to support future generations like Alyssa. The funding will provide support beginning in the fall of 2024 with an endowment awarded in perpetuity. Both the Burke and Fluet families are making this gift possible with their combined support.
- An anonymous donor made a final pledge payment of \$500,000 supporting a few efforts, including persistence grants and coaching for sophomores and juniors and creating the RISE (Resources and Inspiration for Student Empowerment) program connecting first-generation students with a success coach that provides support in navigating academic and social life at Salem State. They are interested in systematic change via philanthropy and realize that Salem State sits at the nexus of being a catalyst for change given the demographic of the

students we serve. We believe there might be an opportunity for continued increased funding in the future.

- Advancement partnered with Salem State's Center for Genocide and Holocaust Studies (CHGS) to submit a proposal to Cummings Foundation in December to apply for renewed funding of CHGS. If granted, it would build upon the 10 years of support the Center has received previously from Cummings and continues CHGS's annual travel to Rwanda where students study the impact of genocide. A fellowship role would be created and embedded in the programming to build year-round CHGS programming, ensuring greater access for Salem State students and broader academic impact.
- Kent and Nancy Van Zant have been longtime advocates for public higher education. After visiting and learning about our students, the Van Zants were moved to create an experiential learning fund for students studying geological sciences. With their generous commitment this academic year, they will support student stipends in geological sciences for the Montana field camp trip, facultyled research opportunities and unpaid internships.
- Dr. Francis Hunkins and Dr. Patricia Hammill made a recent gift of \$100,000 to support the Center for International Education and faculty-led travel. This gift will provide stipends for faculty instructors and students to participate in faculty-led study travel programs. A portion of their gift will support between 6-15 students to travel to Nanjing Normal University in China, our long-term partner, which also sends a cohort of English majors to Salem State each year. This travel program will last one month, currently scheduled for May 20-June 17, 2024.
- Mario Gabelli committed an additional \$70,000 to the Bertolon School of Business Cabot Wealth Management Laboratory and has offered it as a match.
- An anonymous donor from the class of 1972 established a named scholarship fund with a pledge of \$50,000. This scholarship will provide financial assistance with a preference to students from Beverly, Mass.
- The Klarman Family Foundation made a gift of \$500,000 to support the School of Social Work. This planning grant supports the school in identifying needs and areas of opportunity while providing direct aid for students.

Calendar Year-end Fundraising Campaign:

This year's calendar year-end fundraising campaign focused on fundraising for four of our schools and colleges and included segmented and unique direct mail appeals sent to over 58,000 mailable alumni. The school-based solicitations were written with Dean Raminder Luther of the Bertolon School of Business, Dean Joseph Cambone of the McKeown School of Education, Dean Sami Ansari of the Maguire Meservey School of Health and Human Services, and Dean Brian Vander Heuvel of the College of Arts and Sciences. The letters focus on supporting each unit's funding priorities. In addition to

direct mail, email and social media campaigns reinforced the direct mail efforts. If you would like to learn more about these funds, please visit https://www.salemstate.edu/alumni-and-friends/meetmoment/areas-support/unrestricted-support.

Passing:

A dear Viking was lost to us since we last met. Jacob Segal '17H, a proud member of the Salem State community who served on the foundation board and then on the toard of Trustees, holding the first position of trustee emeritus. He harnessed his energy to encourage friends to join him in supporting Salem State's mission. His pride in the work of the university was inspiring to so many. Due to his decades of involvement, the Segal family has encouraged friends and family to support the Marilyn J. and Jacob S. Segal Scholarship Fund in Jake's memory.

Annual Scholar and Donor Reception:

This was the second year of expanding our marquee stewardship event to include all Sullivan Society, Crosby Society, consecutive donors, board members, previous fiscal year donors, and all donors who established a fund. We had record-breaking attendance with 340 participants, which included donors, student scholars and their families, faculty, staff, and administrators for a celebration hosted by the Salem State University Alumni Association and Foundation, Inc., in the Gassett Fitness Center.

Annual Impact Report:

Our *Your Impact in Action* publication will be mailed later this month to an expanded audience of over 14,000 donors, donor prospects, volunteers, and employees. This will be the second year that the publication includes the AA&F's annual report. Digital versions will be shared via email and on the website. We welcome your feedback on any materials we produce. If you do not receive your copy, please let Vice President Webster Crounse know.

We are grateful to the board of trustees for their commitment to supporting the campaign's success.

Alumni Events:

In partnership with the Council of Presidents and D.C. residents Lucy '64 and Brian Conboy, Salem State alumni and friends gathered in Washington, D.C. in late September for two events. The first event took place in the Russell Senate Office Building and celebrated public education throughout the Commonwealth, in partnership with our eight sister institutions. Our second event was focused on our *Meet the Moment*™ campaign and was hosted by the Conboys in their residence. It was our first trip to Washington, D.C. in more than five years and between the two events, we welcomed nearly 30 alumni and friends in celebration of Salem State.

After returning from Washington, D.C., Salem State alumni and friends gathered for a Worcester Red Sox game at the new Polar Park on September 16 for our first intentional outreach in the central Massachusetts area. The event hosted 44 alumni and friends, more than 80 percent of whom were first-time event attendees.

Thursday, September 21 saw the return of our annual fall workshop at the Hawthorne Hotel, which was presented by the Friends of the School of Social Work. With more than 60 participants both in person and online, the workshop was one of the largest attended yet, focusing on those working in clinical practice with older adults. The friends

continued their longstanding tradition of incorporating faculty members from the Salem State School of Social Work with the program presented by Professor Mbita Mbao PhD.

On November 16, 2023, the Friends of the McKeown School of Education hosted their annual Northeast Regional Educators Hall of Fame. The four awards presented included three Salem State alumni and one longtime Salem State administrator. Monthly Fundraising Dashboard Fiscal Year 2024 November 30, 2023






